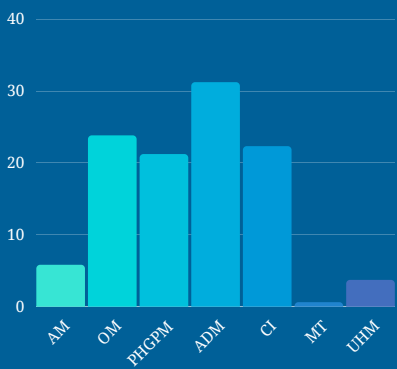




# ABPM's 2020 MOC Survey

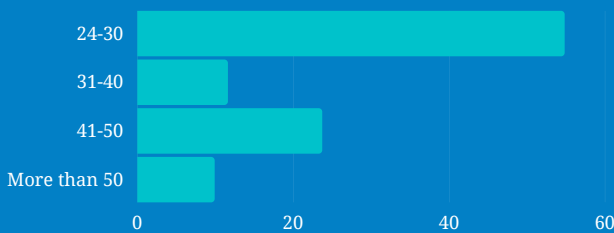
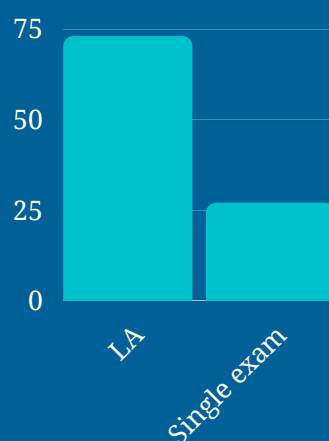


93% of respondents prefer a 10-year certification cycle

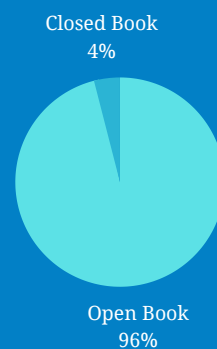
rather than a 5-year cycle, after which the Board will make a summative decision relative to a Diplomate's certification.

73% preferred an annual longitudinal assessment (LA) over a single, high-stakes exam required once per cycle.

81% agreed that Diplomates should be able to choose between participating in the LA or taking the single, high-stakes exam.

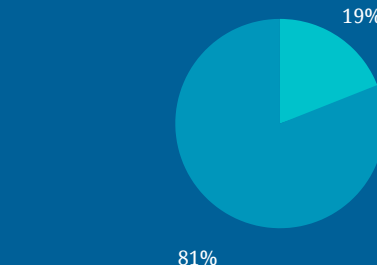
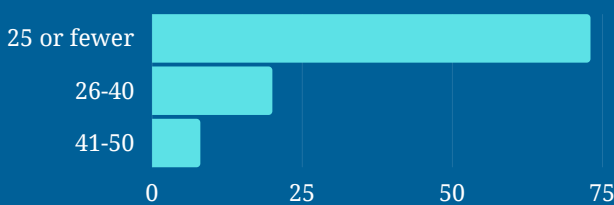


Over half of respondents think Diplomates should answer 24-30 questions annually for the longitudinal assessment.

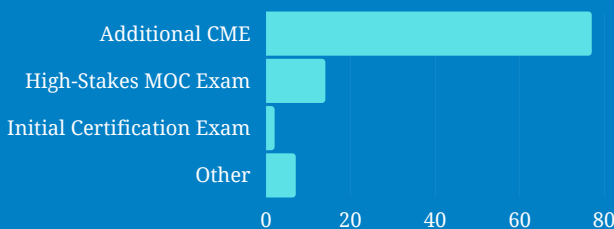


A vast majority of all respondents would like to be able to access reference materials while answering LAP questions.

About 73% of respondents preferred a requirement of 25 CME credits per year or fewer.



81% of respondents think Diplomates should receive credit for any CME activities and Improvement in Medical Practice activities they complete, regardless of topic or relevant specialty.



More than 75% of all respondents would prefer additional CME requirements as a method of remediation for Diplomates who do not meet performance standards during a Certification cycle.
